The Diocese of Springfield-Cape Girardeau reports an allegation of sexual abuse of a minor involving Fr. William E. Donovan, deceased (1975). The allegation pertains to a period in 1968. Following procedures outlined in diocesan Safe Environment Policies and Procedures, the Diocese has notified the Dunklin County Prosecuting Attorney. Additionally, pastoral support has been offered to the victim/survivor's family.

Father William Edward Donovan was born in 1930 in Rome, NY. He was ordained a priest in 1955 in St. Louis for the Archdiocese of St. Louis. The Diocese of Springfield Cape Girardeau was formed in 1956 from territory that was prior to 1956, part of the Archdiocese of St. Louis and the Diocese of Kansas City. Father Donovan died Feb. 9, 1975.

1966—Pastor, St. Ann Parish, Malden, MO, and St. Margaret Mary Mission Church, Neelyville, MO (closed in 1986);

1968—Pastor, St. Teresa Parish, Glennonville, MO, and Sacred Heart Mission Church, Wilhelmina, MO (closed in 1978).

1. Any suspected or known abuse of a minor must first be immediately reported to the Missouri Child Abuse and Neglect Hotline 800-392-3738 or 844-CAN-TELL; or for suspected or known abuse of vulnerable or eligible adults, the Missouri Adult Abuse and Neglect Hotline 800-392- 0210;
2. Contact your local law enforcement agency or call 911, and;
3. All Church personnel are required to also report to the Diocese violations of The Code of Conduct for Clergy, Employees, and Adult Volunteers Working with Minors to the Director of Child and Youth Protection, William Holtmeyer, Jr., MS, NCC, LPC, CEAP at billholtmeyer@dioscg.org or (417) 866-0841.
